## **10<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL MOON OVER THREE CAVES DANCE** **TO BENEFIT THE LAND TRUST**

**HUNTSVILLE – The 10<sup>th</sup> Annual Moon Over Three Caves Dance, scheduled for Saturday, September 19, from 7:00 to 11 pm, will benefit the land preservation work of The Land Trust of Huntsville & North Alabama. The event site is Historic Three Caves Quarry at the foot of Monte Sano Mountain in Huntsville. Presenting Sponsors are Solid Earth, Inc. and Servis1st Bank.**

Three Caves is a former limestone quarry that’s fast becoming a natural cave. The caves will be professionally lit by world-class **Theatrical Lighting Services (TLS,Inc.)**.
